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

At least 80 dead in Bastille Day attack

France to target terrorists after truck plows through crowd in Nice

NICE, FRANCE — A truck loaded with weapons and hand grenades drove onto a sidewalk for more than a mile, plowing through Bastille Day revelers who'd gathered to watch fireworks on the French resort city of Nice late Thursday. At least 80 people were killed before police killed the driver, authorities said.

Nice prosecutor Jean Michel Pierrat described a horrific scene, with bodies strewn along the roadway, and Sylvie Tollin, a press officer with the local prefecture, said the truck ran over people on a "long strip" down the sidewalk near Nice's Palais de la Méditerranée, a

building that fronts the beach. Wassim Bouhelal, a Moroccan who spoke to the AP nearby, said that he saw a truck drive into the crowd. "There was carnage on the road," he said. "Bodies everywhere." He said the driver emerged with a gun and started shooting.

France's Interior Minister Bernard Cazeneuve said 80 people were killed, including children, and 18 were in critical condition, and the Paris prosecutor's office announced an investigation for "murder."

"Clementa Stinchney, where are you?" she began. "Because of what happened that evening, a father, a husband ... lost by our side."

U.S. Rep. Tim Clyburn, D-S.C., emceed a "speak out" that Prackney attended on the steps of the Capitol

Sen. Scott: 'I bring you real hope'

Offers solutions amid police violence debate

WASHINGTON — Hissinger's nodded on U.S. Sen. Tim Scott.

"It's a dark hour in race relations for America," the South Carolina Republican said on the Senate floor Thursday. "But I bring you hope, real hope: I'm like Deep South, with a progressive racial ideology, the way of the 116 Congressional District of South Carolina — a heavily white district, the home of the Birthplace of the Civil War — elected the grandson of a man who picked cotton."

"I want to say that one more time," Scott said. "In the heart of the South, the home of the Civil War, a majority white district elected the grandson of a man who picked cotton over the children of the former United States senator and presidential candidate Strom Thurmond, and a very popular governor."

HOOPER, Ala. — No, Will Muschamp is not on the hot seat.

In fact, nobody has even said Will Muschamp is on the hot seat. The "hot seat" talk surrounding South Carolina's new head football coach comes from a national columnist who listed Muschamp in the "pressure mounting" category of his annual "hot seat rankings."

Nobody is saying there's any chance Muschamp's job is in jeopardy in the next year, but there is a

real issue at the heart of this conversation and that is this: The Gamecocks' new coach won't get the benefit of the doubt usually afforded new coaches.

Muschamp was Florida's coach from 2011-2014 and was fired with a 28-21 record. Fair or not, that was his honeymoon period.



Easley pastor GOP convention speaker

From a makeshift studio in a small office building on a side street near downtown Easley, Pastor Mark Burns reaches out to the world with the gospel message via his internet-based Christian TV network.

Next week, he will be reaching out to the world at the Republican National Convention with what he sees as a similar message — one of love and unity in a time of hate and racial division.

It's not the first time Burns, who pastors a small church in the same office building on Wyatt Avenue, has stumbled for the presumptive Republican presidential nominee.

He's been a part of the Donald Trump touring team ever since before the bill-

ionaire businessman officially began his campaign, firing up crowds before the candidate takes the stage in venues across the country, and in interviews with all the major media outlets.

He told *The Greenville News* on Thursday that he plans to say Monday at the RNC much the same kind of things he's been saying during Trump events.

"My message across this country on the Trump rallies has been consistent, which is about unifying our people," he said. "And when I say our people, I mean Americans — that we should not be focusing on the colors that divide us but really focus on the colors that unite us. That's the red, white and blue of America."

And Donald Trump, he says, is the candidate who has the ability to do that. "I think he is, by really focusing on is-

sues that are not color based but real issues that are impacting the human race," Burns said. "And that is, No. 1, jobs."

"Poverty doesn't know any color. Poverty doesn't recognize a race. Poverty can affect anyone despite the color of their skin."

How a small-town preacher who had no reputation as a political power and shaker came to be a surrogate for Trump can be traced back to his internet-based TV network, theNOWnetwork.org.

Through it, Burns became acquainted with evangelist Paula White, a Trump ally, who invited Burns to participate in a meeting at Trump Tower in New York last September. Trump was exploring the possibility of running for president

Hospital trustees OK nursing home sale

Greenville Health System trustees on Thursday unanimously approved the sale of the Cottages at Brushy Creek to a private nursing home company.

The 144-bed nursing home in Greer was built by GHS in 2007 and hasn't been making money.

The sale price was listed as \$10.1 million and a closing is expected by Sept. 30.

The decision was made to sell the facility to Orianna Health Systems, a private company based in Memphis, Tennessee with nursing homes in 11 states, including 17 in South Carolina. Thirteen of them are in the Upstate, including a 132-bed facility on Kutherford Road in Greenville.

Malcolm Isley, vice president of strategic services for GHS, said the hospital evaluated its holdings and concluded that nursing home services are not a core competency. So he decided the Cottages would be better off run by a company that specializes in skilled nursing care, he said.

Meanwhile, he said, the proceeds could be put into other services.

Rep. Mike Burns, a member of the Greenville County legislative delegation that has been critical of GHS's plans to restructure to a private nonprofit from a public nonprofit, said that selling a property which is losing money makes sense.

"I don't have a problem with them going through proper channels to sell it off if it's not profitable," he said. "But I do have a problem with them going out and buying hospital systems like Oconee and Laurens, which were not profitable. I'm glad they're doing something to stem the losses and make a profit."

GHS recently announced a \$16 million budget shortfall. It's made pro-

Trump postpones VP choice

Presumptive GOP nominee cites France attacks for decision; Pence the favorite

WASHINGTON — Donald Trump abruptly postponed plans to announce his vice presidential pick following a day of rampant speculation, citing the "horrible attack" in Nice, France, that left scores dead.

Trump had planned to hold his first event with his yet-to-be-named running mate Friday morning in New York. He announced the change of plans Thursday evening on Twitter. The stunning announcement raised questions about the status of Trump's selection process. Indiana Gov. Mike Pence had emerged as a late favorite for the job, though Trump said he had not finalized the pick and advisers cautioned he could change his mind.

"I haven't made my final, final decision," Trump said on Fox News.

After spending much of Thursday in Indianapolis, Pence flew to New York late in the day, according to a Republican familiar with the process. Indianapolis television station WTHR posted a video showing Pence arriving at a private airport in New Jersey early Thursday evening.

Trump did not say when he planned to announce his running mate. He's up against a clock: The Republican convention kicks off in Cleveland Monday.

In addition to Pence, Trump's

USDA funds project on drug abuse

FLORENCE — The Florence County Commission on Alcohol and Drug Abuse received a \$318,218 grant Wednesday from the United States Department of Agriculture to help increase access to treatment and preventative care in rural communities throughout South Carolina.

"We're going to have a fully integrated statewide system for the alcohol and drug agencies,"

said Randy Cole, chief executive officer of the Florence County Commission on Drug and Alcohol Abuse at Circle Park.

Although the system will benefit patients across the state, Florence is credited for receiving the grant because Cole and Circle Park applied on behalf of the statewide drug and alcohol system formed by legislative Act 301.

When patients are transferred from a behavioral center such as Circle Park to a hospital or other rehabilitation center, the line of

communication often is cut after paperwork is signed to confirm that a patient was received.

Cole hopes the money from the telemedicine grant will change that. The grant provides a video system, which will serve as a tool for communication with patients, referrals and other folks on the network, Cole said.

It allows for warmer exchange and a face-to-face discussion between patients and their counselors.

"Most of our population falls through the cracks. When they

want help for an alcohol or drug issue, they fall through the cracks," Cole said. "It's just one more way to eliminate barriers to service."

The system also can link some of the smaller centers with larger centers across the state to provide access to more services.

The grant is part of a larger USDA announcement of nearly \$23.4 million Distance Learning and Telehealth grants, which will fund more than 80 projects in 32 states.

Florence's project is one of 36

telemedicine projects, which are used to provide a wide variety of health services from primary care to chronic and specialty health needs and can be used to address opioid misuse, a problem that is especially prevalent in rural areas, according to the USDA.

The funding was announced Thursday by Tom Vilsack, the United States secretary of agriculture, who is leading an inter-agency effort on the opioid epidemic affecting communities across the country.

Town administrator Mary Blues said Thursday afternoon that she and the mayor were unaware of a called meeting set for today.

'There was carnage on the road,' eyewitness says

Truck that plowed down people on sidewalk was loaded with grenades

A truck loaded with weapons and hand grenades drove onto a sidewalk for more than a mile, plowing through Bastille Day revelers who'd gathered to watch fireworks in the French resort city of Nice late Thursday. At least 77 people were killed, authorities said, and

some officials and witnesses called it a deliberate attack. Nice prosecutor Jean-Michel Pestre described a horrific scene, with bodies strewn about along the roadway. However, he stopped short of using the word attack, while acknowledging that "it has many ingredients of an attack that allow us to think that." The ranking politician of the Alpes-Maritime department that includes Nice said the

truck plowed into the crowd over a distance of 1.2 miles, killing 77 people and wounding 50. Many of those on the ground were in shorts and other summer clothing. Eric Ciotti said on BFM TV that police killed the driver "apparently after an exchange of gunfire." Sylvie Toffin, a press officer with the local prefecture, said the truck ran over people on a "long trip" down the sidewalk near Nice's Palais de la Méditerranée, a building that fronts the beach. Wassim Bouhlef, a Nice native who spoke to the AP nearby, said that he saw a truck drive into the crowd. "There was carnage on the road," he said. "Bodies everywhere."

THE TRUCK PLOWED INTO THE CROWD OVER A DISTANCE OF 1.2 MILES.

The president of the Provence Alpes Côte d'Azur regional council, which includes Nice, said the truck was loaded with arms and grenades. Christian Estrosi told BFM TV that "the driver fired on the crowd, according to the police who killed him." Bouhlef said he witnessed the man emerge with a gun and start shooting. Images being broadcast across French media showed revelers running for their lives down Nice's palm tree-lined Promenade des Anglais, the famous seaside boulevard named for the English aristocrats who proposed its construction in the 19th century. Video footage showed men and women — one or two pushing strollers — racing to get away from the scenes. And, in

Greenwood family near France attack

Dr. Sameh Makar Hanna with Greenwood Internal Medicine said he and his family — wife Dalia Botros and children Nadine, 12, and Alexander, 6 — were near the scene of the Thursday night attacks in Nice, France, but were unharmed.

"God is good," he said via Facebook messenger.

Hanna said about 10 p.m. — or 4 a.m. in Nice — that he "never imagined this would happen to us, but grateful we left the shooting area just minutes before it happened."

In what officials and eyewitnesses are calling a deliberate attack, a truck

instinctively held the kids and ran too not knowing what was happening. My wife did see a lady bleeding out of her leg."

He highlighted some of the projects the committee selected to be funded by the penny tax if it passes in November. Among them were countywide improvements to the emergency radio systems, improvements to law enforcement record management and the fire services master plan.

Struggling rescue farm seeks aid from the community
