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## **State Spending Trends 2016**

For states in the coming year, no news is good news when it comes to finances. For the last few years, states on the whole have seen a slow and steady increase in revenues. States collected \$912 billion in total tax revenues in fiscal year 2015—an increase of 5.6 percent over 2014 levels. Growth over this time was widespread—47 states reported growth—while three states, Alaska, Illinois and North Dakota, reported declines.

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## **SCOTUS to Decide Immigration Deferred Action Case**

The U.S. Supreme Court has agreed to decide whether the president's deferred action immigration program violates federal law or is unconstitutional. The court will issue an opinion in *United States v. Texas* by the end of June 2016. The Deferred Action for Parents of Americans program allows certain undocumented immigrants who have lived in the United States for five years and either came here as children or already have children who are U.S. citizens or permanent residents to lawfully stay and work temporarily in the United States. About 5 million people are affected.

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
