Dear Friends,

I am pleased to bring you an update from the South Carolina Department of Education. This week, I will be visiting schools in Calhoun County, speaking to students at the USC Honors College, and attending the inauguration of Dr. Richard E. Cosentino, the 12th President of Lander University.

The Safe Schools Taskforce I convened in the fall of 2015, issued its final report and recommendations. We brought together a diverse group of parents, law enforcement, and educators to review current school policies and educator and law enforcement training criteria. The Department has convened four Uniform Grade Policy subcommittees that are developing recommendations to shift the state from a seven-point to ten-point grading scale. More information will be provided as the workgroups continue their research and collaboration; a final proposal must be approved by the State Board of Education.

On April 20th, I am very excited to be announcing South Carolina's new Teacher of the Year. This newsletter has stories about all five finalists and I hope you will take a minute to read them all. I am grateful for the wonderful students, parents, teachers, and administrators who support our public education system. I will continue to work hard on your behalf.

## #1 Dr. Leah Barley

Florence One : Dr. Barley teaches language and writing in grades 1–6 at Royall Elementary School in Florence School District One. She is also an Education and Leadership Professor. Dr. Barley attributes her success in the classroom to building positive relationships with students, parents, and the school community.

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## #2 Mr. Joey Trail

Horry County Schools : Trail is a seventh-grade English language arts teacher at Forestbrook Middle School in Horry County. Trail worked in the entertainment field for 16 years but recognized that he wanted to focus on his passion for youth advocacy. He decided to enter the teaching profession and use his skills in entertainment to engage his students.

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## #3 Sabrina Williams

Lexington Two : Sabrina Williams teaches social studies and humanities in grades 6–8 at Fulmer Middle School in Lexington County School District Two. She developed a love for teaching after helping her young sister overcome academic challenges in school. Williams believes a passion for making a difference and care for students is the foundation of being an effective teacher.

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## #4 Jennifer Wise

Richland One : Jennifer Wise is a seventh- and eighth-grade mathematics teacher at Hand Middle School in Richland School District One. Jennifer always wanted to help and work with children.
