Teleconference on OAA Title IIID Changes

Funding from Title IIID of the Older Americans Act must be used for evidence-based (EB) programs only. The Administration for Community Living (ACL) currently operates under a three-tier definition of EB, however, beginning October 1, 2016, the current three-tier definition will be replaced with a single higher set of criteria that all programs must meet. Those programs that currently meet the highest-level of criteria in the three-tier system will meet the future definition of EB:

- Demonstrated through evaluation to be effective for improving the health and well-being or reducing disease, disability and/or injury among older adults; and
- Proven effective with older adult population, using Experimental or Quasi-Experimental Design; and
- Research results published in a peer-review journal; and
- Fully translated in one or more community site(s); and
- Includes developed dissemination products that are available to the public.

ACL will be holding a teleconference to discuss these changes in greater detail on **Wednesday October 22, 2014 from 2:00 - 3:30 p.m. EST**. Call-in information: 800-988-9478; passcode: 1180233.

Webinar: Bisexuality and Aging

The American Society on Aging is hosting a webinar on **Thursday, October 23rd at 1:00PM EST**, to help professionals in the field of aging become more aware of bisexuality and will serve to educate them in how best to work with this population.

Bisexuality often is viewed as being part gay and part straight, rather than as its own identity. Not only do bisexuals face discrimination by heterosexuals, but also experience resistance within the lesbian, gay, transgender (LGT) community, with bisexuals often being perceived as "sitting on the fence" (biphobia); however, issues confronting older lesbians and gay men partially overlap with the experiences of older bisexuals.

Effects of PACE on Medicare and Medicaid Expenditures

In a report prepared for the Office of Disability, Aging and Long-Term Care Policy, Office of the Assistant Secretary for Planning and Evaluation, U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, researchers from Mathematica Policy Research examined the effects of the Program of All-Inclusive Care for the Elderly

(PACE) on several expenditure and health variables. Based on a comprehensive review of existing evaluations of PACE, this report brings together available evidence on the effect of PACE on several key outcomes of interest: Medicare and Medicaid costs, hospital and nursing home utilization, quality of care, satisfaction and quality of life, and mortality. Key findings from the literature review include the following:

- The evidence from studies with the strongest design show that PACE has no significant effect on Medicare costs, but it is associated with significantly higher Medicaid costs, with the Medicaid spending gap between PACE and matched comparison enrollees decreasing over time. The authors conclude that PACE does not save costs for either program, and it raises overall cost through an increase in Medicaid expenditures.
- Evidence on the effect of PACE on the utilization of expensive acute and long-term care services is mixed--studies with the strongest design find PACE enrollees have fewer inpatient hospitalizations than their fee-for-service counterparts, but they appear to have higher rates of nursing home admission. None of the studies, however, differentiate between post-acute and long-term nursing home stays.
- There is some evidence that PACE improves certain aspects of care quality --for example, those related to management of specific health issues such as pain--and that PACE enrollees have a lower mortality rate.
