Candidates and voter Registration offices across the state are busy this week as the primaries get closer. On Tuesday, Senator Marco Rubio made a stop at the Francis Marion University Performing Arts Center. Before he spoke to an estimated crowd of 600 he spoke to the media. One thing he discussed is Governor Nikki Haley's place in this year's presidential election.

Note: "I've always been a huge fan of her career trajectory. I think last year, after the shooting at Mother Emanuel, she showed tremendous leadership," Rubio said. "If she wants to continue in public service there is now doubt that no matter who our nominee is she will be at the top of the list for various things vice president or the cabinet. I think she is someone who could run as president one day herself," Rubio said.

Former President George W. Bush came in to right the ship for his brother Jeb's trailing campaign in South Carolina just as front-runner Donald Trump is threatening to run away with Saturday's Republican primary. Speaking to a crowd of more than 3,000 people at the North Charleston Convention Center, George Bush made the first presidential stump appearance of his post-White House life.

Note: Another, more veiled reference of Trump came when George W. Bush thanked the state of U.S. immigration laws in 1969 that allowed the family of future Gov. Nikki Haley to immigrate to South Carolina.

Note: Earlier in the day, the former president met privately with Haley and her family before he spoke at a little-publicized trip to an American Legion Post in Columbia. The content of their discussion was not disclosed.

The State: Trump threatens third-party run, bashes Haley

Republican presidential front-runner Donald Trump did not close the door Monday on a possible third-party run, accusing the Republican National Committee of breaking its pledge to stay neutral in the race. "The RNC is in default," Trump said during a news conference here. "When somebody is in default, that means the other side can do what they have to do."

Note: "Donald Trump would be wise to know the facts before he discusses serious issues affecting South Carolinians — on both topics, the governor has taken on President Obama directly," Haley deputy chief of staff Rob Godfrey said.

Note: Haley, one of the state's most popular Republicans, has criticized Trump on several occasions for his combative campaign tactics, including in her State of the Union response last month, when she asked voters to avoid the "angriest voices."

Republican front-runner Donald Trump on Monday underscored his opposition to shipping enemy combatants from Guantanamo Bay to the nearby Navy brig. Trump, who talked about the issue during a campaign stop at Hanahan City Hall, made the point earlier while answering a student's question at an East Cooper Republican Club luncheon.

Note: Trump also criticized Gov. Nikki Haley for not doing more to block the settlement of Syrian refugees in her state and for not taking a stronger stand against moving combatants here.

Note: Rob Godfrey, Haley's deputy chief of staff, said Trump would be wise to know the facts before he discusses serious issues affecting South Carolinians. "On both topics, the governor has taken on President Obama directly," Godfrey said. "It's a real shame — Republican governors are looking for a president who will support them, not continue to make their jobs harder with senseless and uneducated attacks."

In her speech, Haley urged voters to resist the temptation "to follow the siren call of the angriest voices," which Trump and others interpreted as criticism of his campaign.

Note: Trump said Haley faced "a very strong onslaught" for her remarks. He noted that she referred to him as one of her "friends" on the morning after her speech.
