South Carolina State Parks Rose Clawson In most cases, the tree will not suffer long term damage from a webworm invasion. If a tree is small or under some kind of other stress, the webworms can defoliate and weaken the tree so it becomes vulnerable to other diseases or pests. Otherwise, the tree will overwinter and recover to continue normal growth the following summer. Predators may include certain ants, yellow-jackets, ladybugs, and birds. The stage during web enclosure helps protect the caterpillars from invading predators while they are feeding most heavily.
