NEW YORK (AP) — Sequestered in his Manhattan high-rise, President-elect Donald Trump is preparing to fill key posts. Former New York Mayor Rudy Giuliani has emerged as the favorite to serve as secretary of state, a senior official said. Although Giuliani has little foreign policy experience, the official said there was no real competition for the job. However, a second official cautioned that John Bolton, a former U.S. ambassador to the United Nations, is in contention for the key post.

NEW YORK (AP) — Roe v. Wade, the 1973 Supreme Court decision legalizing abortion nationwide, could be in jeopardy under Donald Trump's presidency. If a reconfigured high court did overturn it, the likely outcome would be a patchwork of state laws protecting abortion access, others enacting tough bans, and many struggling over what new limits they might impose.
