The State: Scoppe: When good people do good things in a bad way — it's still bad

THERE IS probably no legislator with a longer and deeper commitment to reforming the state Transportation Commission than House Speaker Jay Lucas. So it was more than a little jarring last month when Mr. Lucas introduced a bill and put it on the fast track to strip away the governor's authority to appoint the Transportation secretary and give it back to the Legislature's unaccountable, horse-trading commission. Turns out it was no mistake — but neither had Mr. Lucas gone native. Instead, he was trying to protect the Legislature from a lawsuit whose damage could be debilitating. Left unsaid, but hard not to read between the lines, was the idea that he was trying to preserve a constitutionally questionable maneuver that lawmakers might need to use again this year to maintain the governor's limited authority. The lawsuit stems from a 2007 law that claimed to reform the Transportation Department but didn't. It did allow the governor to appoint the transportation secretary, but only through June 2015, when that power would revert to the still-legislatively appointed Transportation Commission if the Legislature hadn't extended it.

Governor Haley and the Department of Social Services are launching a new program to help recruit foster parents. The initiative is called Champions for Children. According to Governor Haley, 54 percent of foster children are not placed within their own county because there aren't enough foster families. "These children are vulnerable, they have been through a traumatic experience, but they are loveable. And they want a home, and they want a place they will feel protected." DSS Director Susan Alford says her department has worked to streamline the application process ever since the shortage of foster parents was identified. Governor Haley says the goal is to recruit about 1,500 more foster care families.

The head of the S.C. Department of Transportation said Wednesday that S.C. lawmakers should pass changes to the agency's structure before they go home in June. Transportation Secretary Christy Hall said she is concerned about the possibility of nothing happening to restructure the agency during the current legislative session. "Essentially, we have a cloud that's hanging over the agency," Hall said, adding there is uncertainty among employees about who is in charge and how the agency will operate if changes are made.

Note: Meanwhile Wednesday, House leaders sent a letter to Republican Gov. Nikki Haley outlining their plans to take up a Senate proposal to spend \$400 million on road repairs and change the structure of the state's roads agency. However, Haley warned Wednesday that if the House does not agree to the Senate's roads bill, "I strongly believe this bill will die. It will be on the House that they

are the ones that killed it." Haley has said commissioners now are driven by "short-sighted regionalism and political horse trading."

South Carolina's Legislature will not increase the state's gas tax this year, according to a letter from House Speaker Jay Lucas to Gov. Nikki Haley. Lucas, who last week criticized the Senate's roads bill as failing to address a long-term solution for infrastructure, told Haley Wednesday that House Republicans, who hold a majority in the chamber, will not insist on the House version of the roads bill, which would have effectively raised prices at the pump to fund road repairs.

Note: Haley talked to the House GOP Caucus this week, Lucas wrote, and shared his concern about a long-term solution. "Thank you for expressing a concern a vast majority of our caucus shares by recognizing that the Senate bill does not contain a sustainable funding solution," he wrote. "We also appreciate your pledge to work with us to quickly create a long-term sustainable funding model." Haley last year told lawmakers she would approve a 10-cent increase in the gas tax, last raised in 1987, but only if they also passed an income tax rate cut and reformed the way state highway commissioners are selected.

Gov. Nikki Haley on Wednesday removed Kelvin Washington from his seat on Richland County Council. In an executive order, Haley said she was declaring his Lower Richland council seat vacant because Washington had recently been convicted of failure to file state income tax returns for three years. Washington also was indicted Wednesday by a Richland County grand jury on felony driving under the influence with great bodily injury, according to 5th Circuit Solicitor Dan Johnson. Washington has been absent from the past two council meetings.

The state Senate spent two hours Wednesday debating a bill that would require refugees to register with the Department of Social Services in a public online database and be tracked by the State Law Enforcement Division. The bill also creates civil liability for organizations if a refugee from a country linked with terrorism and settled through their group causes harm. During the debate, a Charleston senator questioned why the Senate wasn't doing more to combat domestic terrorism by strengthening gun laws. There are several proposed amendments to the refugees bill. The debate will resume at 11

a.m. Thursday.

The discussion of refugee resettlement in South Carolina has been brought back to the forefront as the S.C. Senate has taken up debate on a bill that would require refugees to register with the state. It follows calls from many Republicans, including governors, across the U.S. last fall to halt Syrian refugees allowed into the country following terrorist attacks in Paris and later, the mass shooting in San Bernardino, California. President Barack Obama had announced the U.S. would take in thousands of Syrians for resettlement amid its civil war. The bill, S.997, if passed, would require refugees to register with the Department of Social Services within 30 days of entering the state and for the information to be maintained by the department's database.

Former Democratic state senator Robert Ford, who left the Statehouse under an ethics cloud and later pleaded guilty to misusing campaign donations, filed to return to office Wednesday. Immediately afterward, the head of the Charleston County Democratic Party had a message for local Dems: Don't vote for Ford. Ford last year was sentenced to probation for misdemeanor ethics violations. Nothing in his plea agreement prevents him from running again. He was sentenced to five years of probation and ordered to pay restitution. The charges stem largely from spending campaign donation money on himself, such as car payments, department store purchases, restaurants, novelty shops and other living expenses. He resigned from the Legislature in June 2013, prior to being indicted.

Spartanburg County residents' health and quality of life have steadily improved, according to a report released Wednesday. The 2016 County Health Rankings, published by the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation and the University of Wisconsin Population Health Institute, measure and compare more than 30 factors that influence health, including education, housing, jobs, smoking and access to healthy food. The report examined the health and well-being of people living in nearly every county in the United States. In South Carolina, Spartanburg County ranked 15th out of 46 counties for health outcomes. In 2015, the county was 17th, and in 2014 it was 18th. The rankings represent how healthy a county is based on mortality and morbidity rates.

The task force is working with Upstate Warrior Solution and the Spartanburg Housing Authority to explore housing opportunities for veterans and their families. The group has hired a full-time peer case manager to address housing and homeless veterans issues with the \$25,000 it received from the county's Robert Wood Johnson Foundation Culture of Health Award. The task force also discussed expanding a mental health "warm line" and a reassurance line. A warm, or crisis, line is a safe and secure outlet for people working on their recovery or who feel they may be facing a crisis.

With a name, face and judicial record finally fleshed out, President Barack Obama's pick for the

Supreme Court vacancy is ready to commence courtesy calls with senators that Democrats hope will ultimately put unbearable election-year pressure on Republicans refusing to consider any Obama nominee. Merrick Garland planned to visit two top Democrats on Thursday, a day after Obama nominated the 63-year-old appellate court judge and former prosecutor for the seat. The White House said that after a two-week Senate recess, Garland will meet with Judiciary Committee Chairman Chuck Grassley, R-Iowa, who's been a chief focus of Democratic attacks for refusing to let his panel hold a hearing for anyone Obama selects, helping to doom the nomination. Declining to see Garland was Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell, R-Ky., who has led the GOP's near-solid blockade against a hearing or vote until the next president makes a choice.

Republican leaders are wavering between grudging acceptance and deep denial about Donald Trump's likely ascent to the GOP presidential nomination. But he still must do better in upcoming contests to get the necessary 1,237 delegates, leaving some opponents with a sliver of hope he can still be stopped. Trump cautions that his supporters would revolt if he falls just short in the delegate count and loses in a rules fight at the GOP convention.

The commander of the Russian Air Force says the withdrawal of the bulk of the Russian forces from Syria should be complete in two to three days. Col.-Gen. Putin on Monday announced the withdrawal of most of the Russian forces from Syria to end a five-and-a-half-month campaign there.
