TIDBIT! Hey, I saw a porpoise! Or did you? Nothing creates more excitement than a gray fin slicing through the water, or a sleek, graceful body jumping out of the waves. But did you see a dolphin or porpoise? Harbor porpoises inhabit northern, colder coastal waters, so you won't find them here. Bottlenose dolphins frequent our waters year round. Their numbers peak in October and November when groups of dolphins migrate to South Carolina and further south for the winter. Get out to a fishing pier and try to spot one!
