I. Earthquake Insurance

- ✓ A. Earthquake insurance covering the entire risks (as of now) of the Sinking Fund was offered for \$ 159,000 per year, with a 2% deductible to the owner and \$ 150,000 per loss to the Sinking Fund.

This coverage was offered to our insureds at .095 per hundred based on a go in coverage of \$ 70 million. We have received approvals in excess of this figure. At that rate the premium would be approximately \$ 50,000.

It is recommended that the Division be authorized to execute the contract for full coverage for \$ 159,000 and that it be offered to the insureds at a rate of 4¢ per hundred, with the Division accepting full coverage on contents and the deductible only in those cases where the owners elect to take the coverage.

- ✓ B. It is recommended that the Division be authorized to employ an accounting clerk II (\$ 4910 - \$ 6550), and that a stenographer station and the salary for the clerk be charged to the Insurance Sinking Fund for the remainder of this fiscal year. Thereafter it will be budgeted through regular channels.

II. State Electrician

- ✓ It is recommended that the Board approve reappointment of Fred Muller as State Electrician for the fiscal year 1969-70.

III. Art Exhibit

- ✓ The S. C. Arts Commission requests permission to set up the State art collection on the first floor of the State House March 2-7, 1970. It is recommended that this request be approved.

IV. State-owned Property not in Use

- ✓ *am* The Housing Authority of Florence, South Carolina desires to purchase several lots which are held by the S. C. School for Boys. The Board of Juvenile Corrections is of the opinion that this property is of no value to the school now or in the future since it does not adjoin the main campus. It is recommended that the Division be authorized to sell this property to the Housing Authority of Florence at its appraised value. The Board of Juvenile Corrections requests that the proceeds from the sale of the property be allocated to the Department for permanent improvements. It is recommended that the Board approve this recommendation.

V. Request for Easement

- ✓ The United States of America, Department of Navy requests an easement of 0.60 acre as a degaussing range at the Charleston Naval Base. It is recommended that this request be approved.

VI. Request for Easement

- ✓ The State has an agreement with the United States of America, Department of Interior for a wildlife refuge at Cape Romain. Since that agreement was executed certain islands have formed through accretion, and there exists a difficulty of preventing squatting and camping in these areas. It is recommended that the State execute an easement granting control of these islands to the Department of Interior in accord with the existing agreement which will permit them to prevent conflicting use of the property.

VII. Purchase of Vehicle

- ✓ The University requests a 1970 Ford LTD for assignment to the Provost. It is recommended that the Board act on this request.

We have a balance of \$18,189.01 left in the Infirmary and Activities Building Account of the Riverside School for Girls.

Since February 1st. of this year, we have had a total of one hundred thirty-five (135) boys go A.W.O.L. from the John G. Richards School for Boys. Our Security Building is not secure at all, as some of these boys are leaving through the windows. I would like to ask that we be allowed to spend \$5,550.00 to put in Security Screens in this building and I have been assured by the representative that it would be almost impossible for a boy to escape. Part of the balance of this money will be used for shrubbery and some additional equipment at the two buildings.

I do hope that the Budget and Control Board will look with favor upon this request. The neighbors of the St. Andrews Community are beginning to lose their patience with so many boys going through their yards.

This joint employment began in 1945 by an agreement between the Board of Health and the Board of Pharmacy in the employment of Thomas D. Wyatt by the Board of Health to set up an enforcement agency to enforce the State Barbiturate Act. Inspections made by the Board of Pharmacy and the Board of Health could be made with much better results if made in connection with each other.

Later, by permission of Dr. G. S. T. Peeples and Dr. C. L. Guyton, with the Board of Pharmacy, Thomas D. Wyatt, Jr. was employed by the Board of Health and the Board of Pharmacy for joint inspection work. Dr. Peeples and Dr. Guyton both granted permission for the employment of Mrs. Mary G. McGeary to do stenographic and secretarial work for the Secretary of the Board of Pharmacy provided that such work did not interfere with her employment by the Health Department.

Mr. Hodge was voted compensation at the June 1969 meeting of the Board of Pharmacy.

Compensation for travel and subsistence in connection with special work done for the Board of Pharmacy by the inspectors is included in the lump sum paid to each inspector.

The above arrangement was known to the former State Auditor, Mr. J. M. Smith, and some of the members of the Budget and Control Board.

Dear Pat:

The Committee appointed to study the Medicaid Program as it affects the State of South Carolina (S.330, 1969) met and organized on September 4, 1969. We have heard witnesses and plan to hear others on costs, application, abuses, etc. in the field of medicaid. It appears, even under our modest programs, it will cost this state as much as \$40,000,000 in state funds based on new minimum figures being discussed nationally for families declared medically indigent. It is the feeling of this committee that the medicaid program is so complex and of such magnitude and the potential cost to the people of this state is so great that a comprehensive and objective study should be made which would require private consultants and the experience gained by other states both pro and con; and, also how we can avoid the pitfalls in the eventual or final cost to this state which cannot be ascertained at this time.

The committee unanimously voted to request the Budget and Control Board for an additional appropriation at this time for interim expenses for this committee of at least \$6,000.00. We will be glad to appear before the Board if necessary to justify this request.

It is the feeling of this committee that the medicaid program is so complex and of such magnitude and the potential cost to the people of this state is so great that a comprehensive and objective study should be made which would require private consultants and the experience gained by other states both pro and con; and, also how we can avoid the pitfalls in the eventual or final cost to this state which cannot be ascertained at this time.

The committee unanimously voted to request the Budget and Control Board for an additional appropriation at this time for interim expenses for this committee of at least \$6,000.00. We will be glad to appear before the Board if necessary to justify this request.
