## S.C. traffic deaths are up

Gas and balmy weather  
 contribute to increase

After years of near-historic lows, 2015 saw an abrupt spike in traffic fatalities on South Carolina's roads — partly due to an unlikely cause.

"We can't ignore the fact that as gas prices have decreased we have seen more people on the roads," S.C. Highway Patrol Sgt. Bob Berns said. "This doesn't necessarily mean we'll see a lot more collisions, but we will if people are making the wrong decision behind the wheel."

As of Monday, there had been 875 fatal crashes this year, compared with 744 in 2014. They had resulted in 942 deaths, compared with 813 in 2014, according to the S.C. Office of Highway Safety.

As the numbers continued to climb this year, South Carolina's public safety officers and Highway Patrol troopers expanded their outreach in old ways and new.

The week before Christmas, the state graduated 40 new troopers, bringing the total number to 772. They went straight to work during the busiest season of the year, as an esti-

## Gowdy support a modest boost for Rubio

Endorsement for GOP candidate in distant third place could sway some conservatives

South Carolina U.S. Rep. Trey Gowdy is a favorite among conservatives for his role investigating former Secretary of State Hillary Clinton during the hearings into the fatal 2012 Benghazi consulate terror attack.

So with his endorsement of Marco Rubio for president, many see him giving the U.S.

senator from Florida at least a temporary boost in the states' GOP primary field where he currently sits in a distant third place.

"A modest bump," College of Charleston political scientist Gibbs Knotts said describing what Gowdy's support means.

Gowdy, a three-term congressman from Spartanburg, made a official Tuesday afternoon, appearing with Rubio during a town

hall rally in Clinton, Iowa.

"If I were not convinced that Marco Rubio was not the person to reverse budget sequestration, interior security and employment in-

cluding, I wouldn't be wasting your time this morning," Gowdy told the crowd.

The show of support came after news of the endorsement leaked Saturday after Gowdy called Rubio "a rock-solid conservative and a strong leader we can count on."

Though not as important as coming from a statewide officeholder — namely U.S. Sen. Tim Scott and Gov. Nikki Haley — the fact that Gowdy's firm among the state's congressional delegation to make a White House pick means it should carry some extra weight in the selection window closer.

The state's GOP primary is Feb. 20.

South Carolina's population is now greater than Alabama's, making the Palmetto state the nation's 23rd largest, thanks to all the new residents pouring in.

Growth has both pros and cons, but if it's a popularity contest between states, South Carolina is among the winners.

New Census Bureau data shows that just four states saw greater domestic migration — more people moving in from other states than moving out — during the 12 months ending July 1.

## Man chases dream, proves doctors wrong, one step at a time

Disabled former athlete uses exoskeleton, trains to walk in Bridge Run

Ten years ago today, then 19-year-old Adam Gorlitsky was driving home to Mount Pleasant from Columbia when he fell and opened his speeding car's spinnies of control, crashing on I-95 on-ramp.

The accident severed the spine of the former Woods High School basketball player and runner, left his paralyzed and changed the course of his life.

When doctors at Atlanta's Shepherd Center, the nation's top spinal cord

and brain injury rehab hospital, told him he'd never walk again, Gorlitsky described it "as a punch in the gut."

And he never truly believed it.

In the months and years to come, friends and acquaintances often asked if he would ever walk again, and he responded that he would walk in about 10 years. The answer was based purely in the faith of modern technology.

### Walking with technology

His prediction came true, for the most part. More than a three months ago, he stood and took his first steps with the use of a Bionik Exoskeleton, an \$18,000 cleared robotic exoskeleton, with the help of rehabilitation experts at Roger Eberly Hall.

## MUSC patients in bind over coverage

Policyholders losing Consumers' Choice, awaiting a solution

A lawsuit over negotiations between Medical University Hospital and South Carolina's largest private health insurance company have seemingly stalled, Nikki Cabwell doesn't know where she'll turn for treatment for her cystic fibrosis come Friday.

The 27-year-old Columbia woman currently receives all her health care through a specialty clinic at MUSC, but her new BlueCross BlueShield of South Carolina plan, which kicks in on Jan. 1, won't cover any services at the Charleston hospital.

## Grand jury decision not end for Rice shooting case

Family suing, police to investigate, civil rights changes possible

CLEVELAND — Despite the grand jury decision not to charge a white patrolman in the killing of 12-year-old Tamir Rice, the case is far from over for the city of Cleveland, the officers involved in the shooting or the black boy's parents' family.

The family is suing the city. Federal prosecutors are looking into possible civil rights charges against Timothy Loehman and his partner, and the two officers face departmental investigations that could result in disciplinary action, including firing.



## \$1.6B mystery project gets OK

\$1.6 billion plant would be largest single investment in South Carolina

Company name to be released at groundbreaking ceremony

Plant is expected to create about 1,400 jobs

### CHESTER

The Chester County Council approved giving tax breaks Tuesday as part of an economic development package to bring a \$1.6 billion manufacturing facility to the county.

The council, without discussion, approved an ordinance for "Project 1429" which could employ as many as 1,400 people.

County officials declined to identify the company or to say where the plant will be built. They said the information will be made public by the company at a February or March groundbreaking ceremony that will likely be attended by Gov. Nikki Haley.

Before approving the ordinance to grant tax incentives, the council held a public hearing on the project. The only information provided before the meeting for residents was its potential investment and jobs it would create and that it was a cellulosic renewable diesel facility.

## What did Congress do in 2015? Education and transportation highlight year

WASHINGTON, D.C. — In a chaotic year, when Republicans in the House unseated a speaker, Congress produced a significant amount of bipartisan legislation that affects every American.

It enacted laws revising federal education policy, restricting government access to bulk phone records, combining highway and transit programs and even resolving a long-standing problem of how Medicare reimburses doctors. Before leaving town for the year, it sent President Barack Obama bipartisan legislation: Friday financing government agencies in 2016 and cutting taxes, mostly by extending dozens of expiring levies.

Here are highlights of an eventful year in Congress:

### Budget deal

A \$1.1 trillion spending bill approved Friday funds the government for the 2016 budget year and extends \$680 billion in tax cuts for businesses and individuals. The deal — a victory for new House Speaker Paul Ryan, R-Wis. — avoids a government shutdown, allows crude oil exports for the first time in 40 years and extends a huge variety of tax breaks, including those for college tuition and renewable energy such as solar and wind power.

### Education

Obama signed a sweeping overhaul of the No Child Left Behind education law, the biggest education reform since 2002. The bipartisan law shifts in a new approach to accountability, teacher evaluations and the way the most poorly performing schools are pushed to improve. Students will still take federally required statewide reading and math exams, but the law encourages states to limit time

National Lab, H Canyon, and several other facilities and missions exited the pause and entered deliberate operations, a reduced work phase during which workers pay close attention to detail.

The last facility operated by SRNS to exit the safety pause was HB Lime — a facility that assists the site's H Canyon in the processing of nuclear materials and the location of the plutonium storage incident.

H Canyon and HB Lime are expected to be the last facilities to exit deliberate opera-

tions with an exit projection scheduled for late January.

### No. 10 — SRNS safety pause

Savannah River Nuclear Solutions, or SRNS, induced a safety pause on Sept. 11 after a Sept. 3 plutonium storage incident. Four workers improperly stored plutonium in a sample container not suitable for storage.

The incident came after several other safety-related incidents, which caused SRNS to freeze work on all nonessential missions and facilities.

## County officials give voice to abused animals

It was only in August when the last of three dogs, victims of animal cruelty in McCormick County, found its forever home by way of The SPCA Albright Center for Animal Welfare in Aiken.

The dogs were found with their muzzles taped shut and later rescued from the Humane Society of McCormick County and its local branches.

Officer Alan Walling, who handles animal control for the City of Aiken, the case involved an elderly man whose barking dogs led to neighbor complaints and him ultimately taking them up. Media outlets later reported the former owner was charged with animal cruelty.

"He thought he was doing right based on the complaint of his neighbors, the dogs barked and everyone's happy — but no, they're not," Walling said. "In the days following, Walling

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

# Officials: Flight to Mexico planned

FORT WORTH, Texas — A teen fugitive who's known for using an "affluenza" defense and his mother attempted to disguise themselves and disappear among the American tourists thronging a Mexican resort city for the holidays, but are now in custody and will be returned to the U.S., authorities said Tuesday.

Tarrant County Sheriff Dee Anderson said 18-year-old Ethan Couch — who was on

juvenile probation after killing four people in a drunken driving wreck — and his mother had prepared to be gone a while, even dyeing Couch's blond hair black, before being detained Monday in the Pacific Coast city of Puerto Vallarta.

"They had planned to disappear. They even had something that was almost akin to a going-away party before leaving town," Anderson said. He would not give details about the event, including how many people attended.

During the sentencing phase of Couch's trial, a defense

expert argued that his wealthy parents coddled him into a sense of irresponsibility — a condition the expert termed "affluenza." The condition is not recognized as a medical diagnosis by the American

Psychiatric Association, and its invocation drew ridicule.

Couch disappeared as authorities investigated whether he had violated the terms of his probation.

Anderson said Couch and his mother, Tonya Couch, apparently crossed the border in her pickup and drove to Puerto Vallarta. It was not clear whether they had any accomplices.

No immediate charges were planned for others who may have known about or assisted with the flight plan, Anderson

Gowdy endorsed Rubio during a campaign stop Tuesday in Clinton, Iowa.

It wasn't the first campaign stop where Gowdy expressed his support for the Florida senator. They appeared together at Cribb's Kitchen in Spartanburg on Dec. 19. That was Rubio's first campaign stop in Spartanburg since announcing his plans to run for the White House.

**Sheriff seeks info in southside shooting**
