The S.C. Department of Education released the 14th-annual report cards for districts and schools in the state this week, showing improvements for many schools throughout the state. For 2014, Sumter School District received an average absolute rating — a slight change from the previous two years in which the district received good absolute ratings.

**Note:** The S.C. Department of Education has also made a major push in improving literacy for South Carolina students in districts across the state, and legislators passed Gov. Nikki Haley's K-12 Education Reform Initiative in mid-April which addresses improving technology in South Carolina schools and employing reading coaches for elementary schools.
