## Charleston showdown

Top vote-getters Tecklenburg, Stavrinakis to battle it out in Nov. 17 runoff to succeed Mayor Riley, lead city in challenging era of growth

The race to become Charleston's first new mayor since 1975 continues for businessman John Tecklenburg and state Rep. Leon Stavrinakis, who bested four other candidates Tuesday.

They now face each other in a Nov. 17 runoff that will determine who moves into City Hall after longtime Mayor Joe Riley moves out.

In unofficial results, Tecklenburg narrowly led Stavrinakis by 37 percent to 36 percent, with 94 of 96 precincts reporting.

"The whole story of this race, according to Leon, thus far was I'm the underdog," Tecklenburg said late Tuesday, "so for me to be at par — or No. 1 — is a huge accomplishment."

most negative campaign in the history of Charleston," referring to candidate Ginny Deerin questioning his record on transportation and the gas tax.

"We are still standing, baby," he said. "One thing you can't do is drown out the voice of the people."

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Tecklenburg recently has worked as a commercial real estate agent, and both he and Deerin have publicly fought against plans to replace the city's Sergeant Jasper with a new building of a similar height.

Deerin, founder of WINGS for Kids, placed a distant third, despite a campaign that raised more than \$800,000.

"What a worthy endeavor this was," said Deerin, who ran Riley's last reelection bid. "Thank you so much for all that every one of you did."

City Councilman William Dudley Gregorie and former Councilman Maurice Washington trailed with about 6 percent of the vote each, while nonprofit director Toby Smith got 1 percent.

## Flood-weary residents face rising rivers again

Only minor flooding likely following this week's downpours

The lower Santee River is coming up over its banks — again. The Edisto River will flood by Thursday, about a month after historic flood levels swamped hundreds of homes and drove residents to higher ground.

But the moderate floods will only reach 2 feet or so above the banks of both rivers, causing few new problems for water-weary residents trying to reclaim their lives. The rain is expected to begin tapering off Wednesday in the Charleston area.

"We're not expecting the rivers to rise to the levels of the recent flood rain," said meteorologist John Quagliarriello, National Weather Service, Charleston. But "minor flooding is expected into next week."

A flood warning was issued for the Santee near Jamestown on Tuesday, and was expected to be issued by Wednesday for the Edisto near Givhans Ferry in Dorchester County, Quagliarriello said.

Both rivers drain waterways across the state. The Santee flooding is due to an increased spill from the Lake Marion dam by the Santee Cooper utility to move that water.



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
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

# Few head to the polls

Voter turnout 6.21 percent in county, officials say

Precincts across Spartanburg County reported low voter turnout in Tuesday's election.

Voter turnout for the election Tuesday was 6.21 percent with 10,120 ballots cast, according to unofficial election results. There are 162,999 registered

voters in Spartanburg County. "We are at about 10,000 votes, which is typical," Henry Laye, Spartanburg County Registrations and Elections director said. "It's still a low turnout."

Sundra Proctor Smith, a poll worker at Beech Springs Intermediate School, said about 2.47 percent of the precinct's registered voters had taken to the

polls Tuesday afternoon.

Smith said the very low turnout, with no voters under the age of 30, was not surprising, but was disappointing. "I hope it isn't the new normal," she said.

Heath Strawn, poll manager at Duncan United Methodist Church, said of nearly 1,200 registered voters in the precinct, only 29 had voted by 1:15 p.m. Tuesday.

At Lyman Town Hall, poll

workers saw a slightly higher turnout. Poll worker Morgan Ring said voters had trickled in steadily all day, with higher numbers after 5 p.m.

"It has been light, but we knew it was going to be light," Ring said. "But, even in off years, you know you'll have bursts in the morning, at lunch and right around dinner time."

## Viney, Burton headed to runoff

Voters will return to polls in 2 weeks

Spartanburg voters will return to the polls in two weeks after no single candidate won a simple majority in the race for an open commissioner of public works seat Tuesday.

Angela Viney, director and development director of Upstate Forever's Spartanburg office, received 1,140 votes, or nearly 47 percent of the total votes, with 97 percent of precincts reporting, according to unofficial results.

Stephanie Burton, an attorney at Gibbs Burton, LLC, gathered 860 votes, just over 35 percent of the total vote.

Viney and Burton surpassed candidates Cheryl J. Jones and B.B. Bryson who received 273 votes and 142 votes, respectively.

To win the commissioner seat, a candidate needs one vote past the 50-percent mark. Spartanburg Registration and Elections

### Council votes to waive permit fees for flood damage repairs

DARLINGTON — Darlington County Council approved a measure temporarily waiving building permit fees for repairs associated with damages resulting from the recent floods.

Currently, to build in uninco-

porated areas applicants must pay building permit fees and floodplain development permit fees if located in a flood zone.

Council approved a resolution waiving the fees on a temporary, case-by-case basis. The county administrator will review requests for waivers.

Council's action came after a

homeowner whose house was damaged in the flooding requested the waiver.

In other business, council heard a presentation from Pastor William Stephens about a program his organization is offering called U Pass it On. Stephens said the program is designed to provide job skills to

job seekers who may not have an alternative means of acquiring job skills.

Stephens asked for council's support for the program.

Members also heard from Anita Dantzler of the South Carolina Human Affairs Commission about the possible formation of a community relations council

for the county sponsored by the commission. Dantzler said the commission is seeking to establish a community relations council in each of the state's 46 counties. She asked council to begin considering potential appointees for a council of 11 members from within the county.




Cheers erupted inside the Ted C. Collins Law Enforcement Center Tuesday night as two incumbents and one former council member learned they had won the three open seats on the Myrtle Beach City Council.

With all 13 polling sites reporting by 8 p.m., incumbents Philip Render and Mike Chestnut were reelected and Mary Jeffcoat won the third seat.

Render and Chestnut tied for the highest percentage of votes in the council race, each taking 21 percent of the total 8,851 votes cast in Tuesday's election. Jeffcoat took 17 percent, beating out contenders Jackie Vereen with 15 percent, Mark McBride with 8 percent, John Krajc with 7

# Hines, Stone set to face off for mayor

## Four vie for council seats

DARLINGTON — Voters in Darlington went to the polls Tuesday to determine three new city council members and a mayor, but preliminary race results proved too close to decide.

### Mayor

Gloria Hines had 448 votes and former Darlington County Councilman Jim Stone had 421 votes — since neither had enough

to call a true majority, another round of voting is set for Nov. 17.

Councilman James "Jimmy" Cooper III placed third with 365 votes and businessman William Jackson placed last with 315 votes.

Both Hines and Stone said they would be campaigning hard through the next two weeks.

"I'll start working again in the morning," Hines said. "I feel great about the results and I want to thank

God first and foremost. There are a lot of things we have to do in Darlington and we're going to do them by working together. I'm thankful to the people of Darlington."

"I'll be getting back to work Wednesday and see if we can change the outcome a little more next go-round," Stone said. "I congratulate Mrs. Hines on her victory today, but we'll see if we can't turn that around in the future. The people of Darlington see

that I'm a capable leader and I thank the ones who voted for me."

### City Council

A field of 12 candidates, the largest ever for a municipal election in Darlington, was narrowed down to four Tuesday night.

Hoyt Campbell, director of the Darlington County Election and Registration Commission, said that since none of the candidates got a majority the top four will be on the Nov.

17 run-off ballot also.

John Milling held 620 votes, Diane Sigmon took 532 votes, Carolyn Bruce had 516 votes and Bryant Gardner had 485 votes.

Campbell said candidate Shelia Bacucus placed fifth with 480 votes — less than one percent away from the closest candidate, meaning a mandatory recount is necessary for those two candidates.

The recount will happen Thursday, Campbell said.

## Timmons ville elects council, school board members

Three seats were open for the council, and the majority of the votes were in favor of William James Jr., Walter Washington and Cheryl Qualls. According to unofficial results, James, who was running for re-election, received a total of 168 votes, Washington received 144 votes and Qualls received 127 votes.

Timmons ville Mayor Pro Tem Curtis Harrison ran for re-election but fell short with 83 votes. There were a total of four write-in votes.

Qualls, who received 24.14 percent of the votes in the Timmons ville Town Council election, said she has been living in the town for a little over a year.

"The one thing about me, Timmons ville is where I chose to make home because we have such wonderful people," Qualls said.

The people of the town are what made her and her family move to Timmons ville, and Qualls said they are soliciting other family members to come also.

Winning a seat on council is exciting, Qualls said.

"(I'm) excited and ready to move Timmons ville to the prime spot it deserves to be in," she said.

Washington, who received 27.38 percent of the votes in Tuesday's election, said his main goal is to transform the way the younger generation thinks.

A total of 526 votes were cast for Timmons ville Town Council.
