South Carolina passed a law in May 2013 aimed at keeping the mentally ill from buying handguns. But if probate courts across the state don't meet an upcoming deadline, guns could end up in the wrong hands.

Note: The bill, signed into law by Governor Nikki Haley, ensures the names of residents declared mentally ill by a South Carolina court go into a federal database, so the names will show up on background checks.

Voters don't head back to the polls until November to cast their ballots for South Carolina governor, but if the election were held today new numbers indicate Governor Nikki Haley would win a second term in office. Palmetto Politics Poll data from 1,000 likely South Carolina voters shows Haley would once again edge democratic Senator Vincent Sheheen just like she did in 2010's history-making election.

The poll of likely voters commissioned by The Post and Courier and three television stations shows that in a matchup with Democrat Vincent Sheheen, Haley leads Sheheen by four percentage points - within the poll's 4 percent margin of error. Haley led overall with 46 percent support of those polled among the 650 likely voters surveyed.

Incumbent South Carolina Gov. Nikki Haley has a small lead over challenger and state Sen. According to the Voter Survey Service poll, Haley has a 13-point lead, 53-40, over Sheheen with 7 percent undecided in the race when the two top contenders are compared head-to-head.
