The State: Survey finds majority in state support Medicaid expansion

More than half of older adults in the state disagree with Gov. Nikki Haley's plan to turn down Medicaid expansion, according to a survey by the AARP. The survey found that 54 percent of the respondents support expanding Medicaid to cover low-income adults. A U.S. Supreme Court decision last summer allowed states to opt out of the Medicaid expansion provision of the federal Affordable Care Act. Haley has pledged not to accept the expansion, saying it's an extension of a wasteful federal program.

Note: Haley and Keck have spoken out against the expansion, but the state Legislature will have a say in the decision. Several bills have been introduced — some requiring the state to turn down expansion, some requiring the state to accept expansion. In budget hearings, no funds have been set aside to pay for the administration of expansion, which even in the early years would be an expense that falls on the state. While some Republicans have expressed reluctance at turning down federal funding, even those leaning towards accepting expansion have said they don't expect to have enough votes to override a veto by Haley.

The poll was commissioned by AARP, a group in favor of expanding Medicaid in South Carolina under the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act. A statement about the poll was published Tuesday on AARP's website, but the full results have not been released.

Note: "The federal government likes to wave around a \$9 match like it is some silver bullet, some extraordinary benefit that we cannot pass up. But what good do the nine dollars do us when we can't come up with the one?" Haley said in January during her State of the State address.

The stock market is back. Five and a half years after the start of a frightening drop that erased \$11 trillion from stock portfolios and made investors despair of ever getting their money back, the Dow Jones industrial average has regained all the losses suffered during the Great Recession and reached a new high. The blue-chip index rose 125.95 points Tuesday and closed at 14,253.77, topping the previous record of 14,164.53 on Oct. 9, 2007, by 89.24 points. "It signals that things are getting back to normal," says Nicolas Colas, chief market strategist at ConvergeX Group, a brokerage. "Unemployment is too high, economic growth too sluggish, but stocks are anticipating improvement."

A family of "nightmare" superbugs — untreatable and often deadly — is spreading through hospitals across the USA, and doctors fear that it may soon be too late to stop them, senior health officials said Tuesday. "These are nightmare bacteria that present a triple threat," said Thomas Frieden, director of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. "They're resistant to nearly all antibiotics. They have high mortality rates, killing half of people with serious infections. And they can spread their resistance to other bacteria."

The senators have argued they can't perform adequate oversight without reviewing the contents of the opinions, but the White House had resisted requests for full disclosure.

President Hugo Chavez was a former paratroop commander and self-styled "subversive" who waged continual battle for his socialist ideals. He bedeviled the United States and outsmarted his rivals time and again, while using Venezuela's vast oil wealth to his political advantage. Chavez led one coup attempt, defeated another and was re-elected three times. Almost the only adversary it seemed he couldn't beat was cancer. He died Tuesday in Caracas at age 58, two years after he was first diagnosed.

In his final report to Congress, Special Inspector General for Iraq Reconstruction Stuart Bowen's conclusion was all too clear: Since the invasion a decade ago this month, the U.S. has spent too much money in Iraq for too few results.

The Obama administration program of sanctions and diplomatic efforts to stop Iran from gaining nuclear capabilities is not working, the top U.S. commander in the Middle East told a Senate committee Tuesday, adding that Tehran has a history of denial and deceit and is "enriching uranium beyond any plausible peaceful purpose." Gen. James Mattis, head of U.S. Central Command, said it still may be possible to use sanctions and other pressure to bring Tehran "to its senses." But he also warned that he believes Iran is using the ongoing negotiations to buy time.

The European Commission formally launched an investigation Wednesday to find out whether energy price cuts granted to industrial clients in Germany is a hidden form of state aid. Large electricity consumers were exempt from paying around €300 million (\$390 million) in network charges last year alone - an arrangement that may put competitors in other member states at a disadvantage, said the Commission, which is also the 27-nation bloc's antitrust watchdog.

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
