The President's declaration doesn't ever expire, although there are certain timeframes on the grant programs it covers. Currently the counties that are declared by the President for Public Assistance are: Allendale, Bamberg, Barnwell, Beaufort, Berkeley, Calhoun, Charleston, Chesterfield, Clarendon, Colleton, Darlington, Dillon, Dorchester, Florence, Georgetown, Horry, Jasper, Kershaw, Lee, Marion, Marlboro, Orangeburg, Richland, Sumter and Williamsburg and the same for Individual Assistance less Richland and Kershaw. The incident period is for a finite amount of time but that is only the time during which the actual incident took place. In this case it is October 4-31. I am not sure if that helps but am happy to discuss at any time!
