Marco Rubio suddenly wants to talk. At 22,000 feet, sipping Dr Pepper and sharing his stash of Twix bars. In a Cracker Barrel over blueberry pancakes. At a news conference until there are no more questions. He chats about how he couldn't bring himself to tell his sons why front-runner Donald Trump was bleeped. Or how Jeb Bush was "missing in action." Or how he emails Mitt Romney and texts Nikki Haley.

**Note:** Haley, South Carolina's governor, has not made an endorsement in the race. Rubio said that he would "love" to have her support and that he keeps in touch with her, mostly through texting. It is not clear that she will move off the sidelines.

Following remarks at the Faith and Family Presidential Forum, Rubio rallied his supporters with his usual stump speech in a chilly airport hanger in Greenville, South Carolina but had nothing but warm words regarding the Palmetto State's economy and job growth. As he listed through his promises should he be the next commander in chief, Rubio said that as president he would "embrace free enterprise."

**Note:** "We're going to do what you've done here in South Carolina," Rubio said. "Look at South Carolina and look at the rest of the country. This is a state where manufacturing is growing. We have to be an economy that makes sense again."

**Note:** Emily Hall, 26, told TheBlaze that Rubio's comments on South Carolina's economy were "absolutely" a reference to the work Haley has done in the state

**Note:** "'It's a great day to be in South Carolina' is always Gov. Haley's tagline, and any day that we can get any national or international company to come in and want to put roots here is always a good thing for South Carolinians and a good thing for America as well," the Clemson graduate said.
