**Quayola:
Pleasant Places**

**NC Museum of Art
March 18 - August 13, 2017**

Inspired by the work of Vincent van

Harry Lauder's walking stick produces an assortment of twisted, curly twigs and dangling male flowers called catkins that creates a spectacular come-outside-and-look sight. This living sculpture becomes even more sublime with every passing year.

Harry Lauder's walking stick was discovered by Victorian gardener Canon Ellacombe growing in a hedgerow around 1863 near Frocester, in Gloucester, England.

Apparently it was a "sport" or mutation of the European filbert (*C. avellana*), which is cultivated for its delicious nuts.

The twisted, misshapen twigs were not named after a famous contortionist, as you would assume, but in honor of the Scottish entertainer, Harry Lauder (1870-1950). Actually, it was named after Sir Lauder's twisted walking stick, his companion on stage as this Scottish baritone sang ballads and comic songs.

Despite its English roots, Harry Lauder's walking stick performs well in the Carolinas. Expect it to grow 10 ft. high and wide. Because 'Harry Lauder' is almost always grafted on European filbert understock, it suckers heavily. The suckers should be promptly removed at the base to prevent the slower-growing scion from being crowded out by the more vigorous understock.

Although Harry Lauder does not bear any edible nuts, it acts like a magnet to attract inquisitive neighbors and passersby. Harry Lauder's walking stick will get people talking.

Tragedies of War

Gogh, U.K.-based artist Quayola traveled to Provence, France, 125 years after Van Gogh famously painted there. As a nod to that painter's expressionist style, Quayola's own Provence landscapes morph from realistic images of windblown trees to abstracted scenes of color and texture, as the natural forms begin to bleed into one another in swirls of disintegrating pixels. Simultaneously, the audio of rustling leaves and wind becomes distorted and abstracted.

The artist writes: *"Through the misuse of image - analysis and manipulation algorithms, Pleasant Places challenges the photographic image and proposes alternative modes of vision and synthesis. As the outlines of trees and shrubs get blurred, nature becomes dense and almost impenetrable. The resulting compositions remain, suggestively, suspended between representation and abstraction, between the depth of the natural scenery and the surface of the screen."*

Part of the national Civil War Trails program, the "Elizabeth City Civil War Trails Tour" weaves together the history of Union occupation in Elizabeth City through real-life accounts. Pick up a copy of the Elizabeth City Civil War Trail Markers Tour brochure at the Visitors Bureau. Then view six markers (within walking distance of the downtown area) that cover events from 1862-1863.

Elizabeth City is just an hour from North Carolina's Outer Banks. It's on the Intracoastal Waterway with access via the Pasquotank River and Historic Dismal Swamp Canal.
