In life, they did not mingle with the powerful, leading modest lives centered on family and church. In death, the powerful turned out Thursday, along with the people who knew Ethel Lance and Sharonda Coleman-Singleton best, to celebrate a different kind of power they wielded.

Note: Gov. Nikki R. Haley, Senator Tim Scott, Mayor Joseph P. Riley Jr. of Charleston, and the civil rights leaders Jesse Jackson and Al Sharpton all attended one or both funerals.

Note: Politics intruded momentarily on the service as well, when Mr. Sharpton said he had never met Governor Haley, but had led a protest outside the State House and had seen her looking down from her window.

Note: When her turn came to speak, Ms. Haley said, “If you were protesting outside my window, if you would have come inside and held out your hand, I would have hugged you.”

Note: Obama praised Gov. Nikki Haley for moving first by asking lawmakers Monday to bring down the flag outside South Carolina's Statehouse. Other politicians then came out saying historic but divisive symbols no longer deserve places of honor.

As South Carolina’s legislature prepares to debate removing the Confederate battle flag from the statehouse grounds, Sen. Tim Scott is weighing in with state lawmakers in typical Scott fashion — quietly and behind the scenes.

Note: South Carolina Gov. Nikki Haley elevated him from the House of Representatives in 2012 to fill the seat of Sen. Jim DeMint, R-S.C., who resigned to head the conservative Heritage Foundation think tank.

Note: He had an 83 percent approval rating among likely South Carolina Republican voters — higher than Haley’s 79 percent, Republican Sen. Lindsey Graham’s 58.2 percent, and the state legislature’s 61 percent approval ratings in an April poll by Winthrop University.
